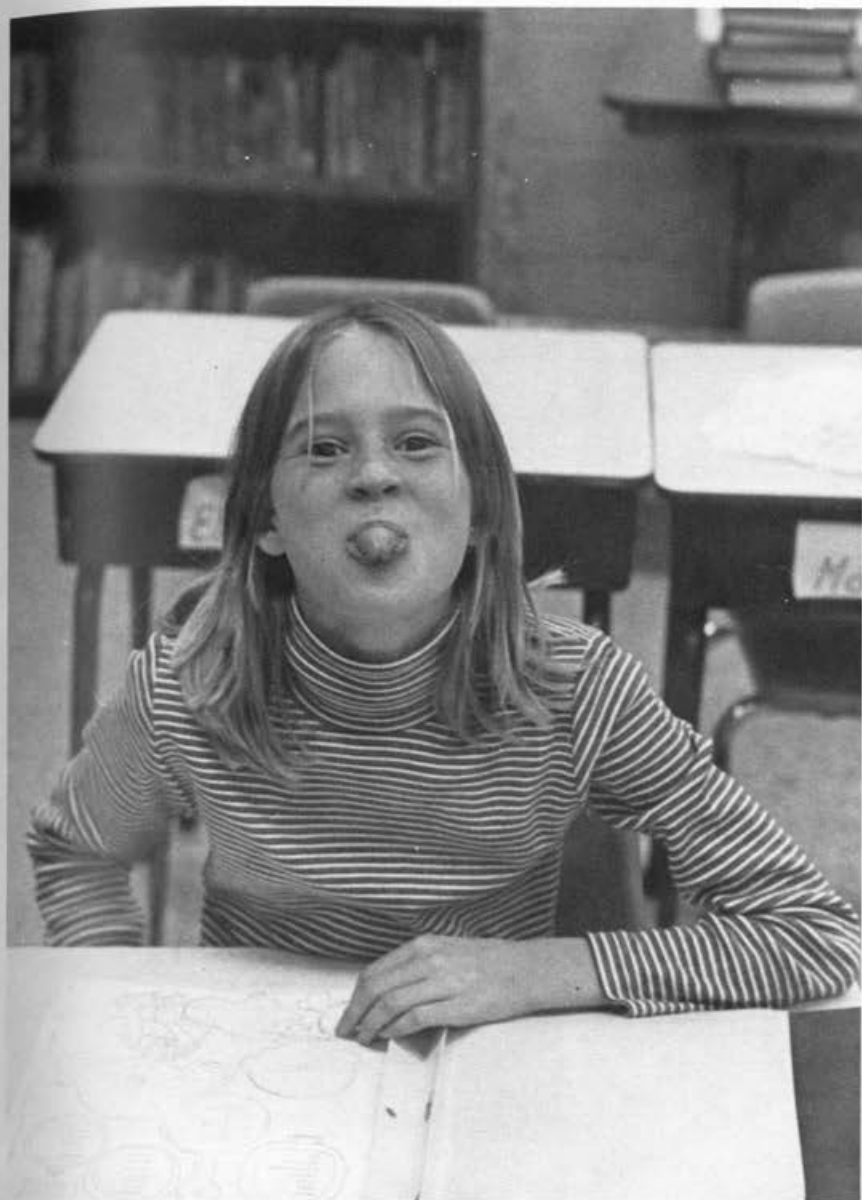




Spirit

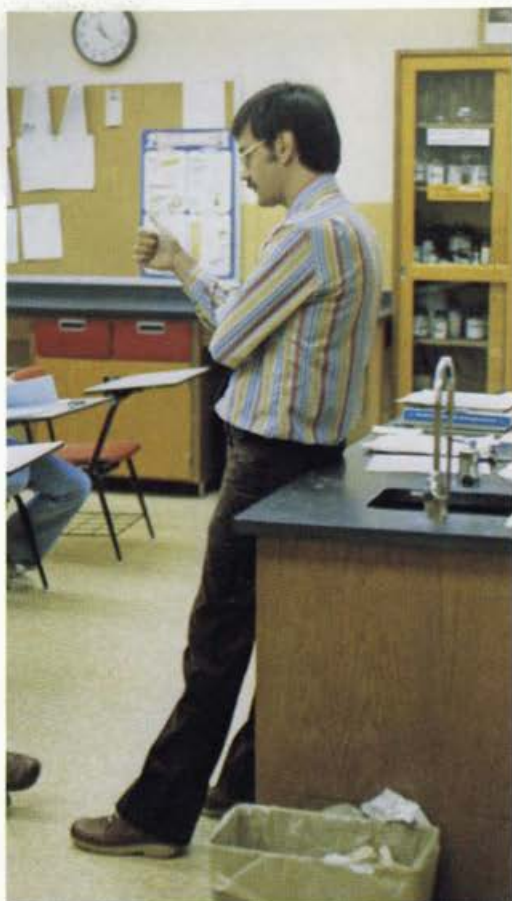






The faces at Providence Day tell a lot about the feelings behind them. They are open, friendly and eager, and they convey the positive feelings that students and teachers have inside.

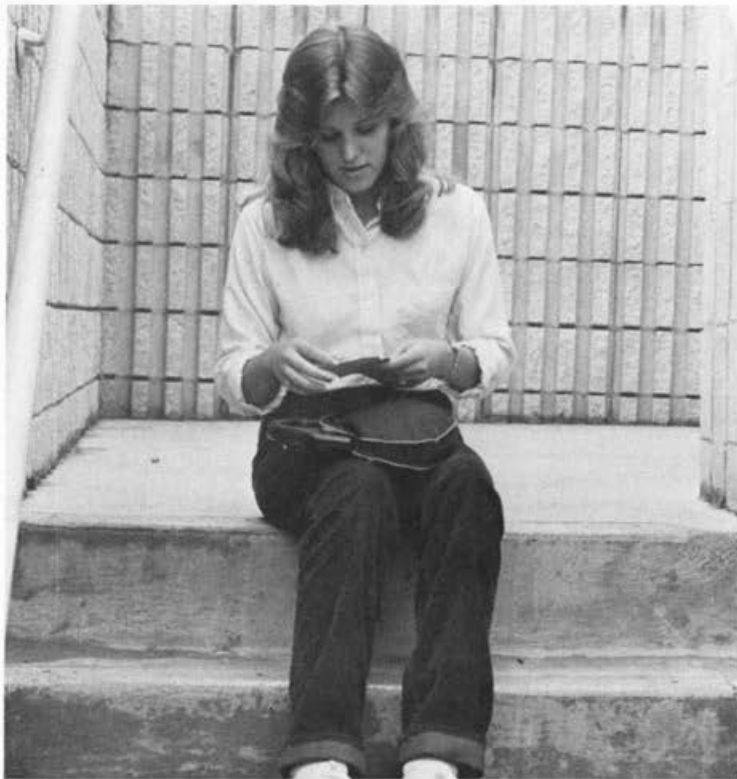

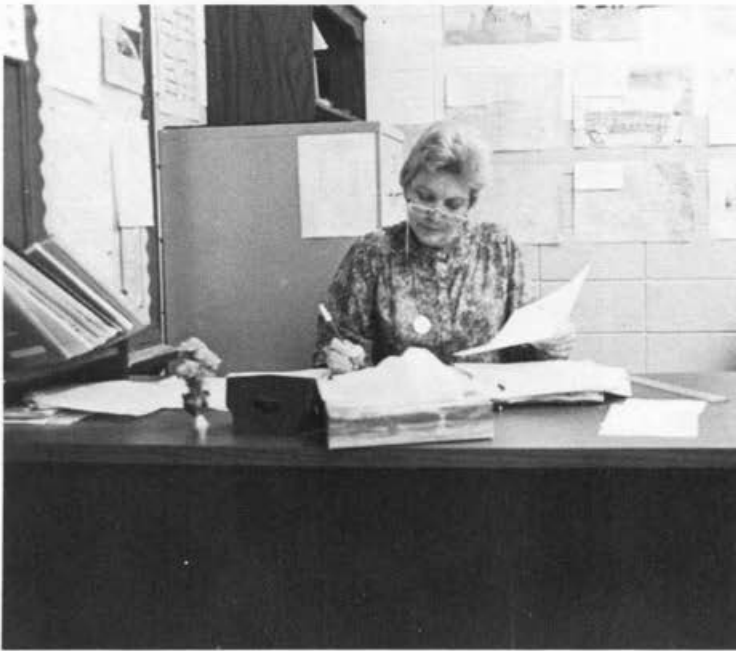

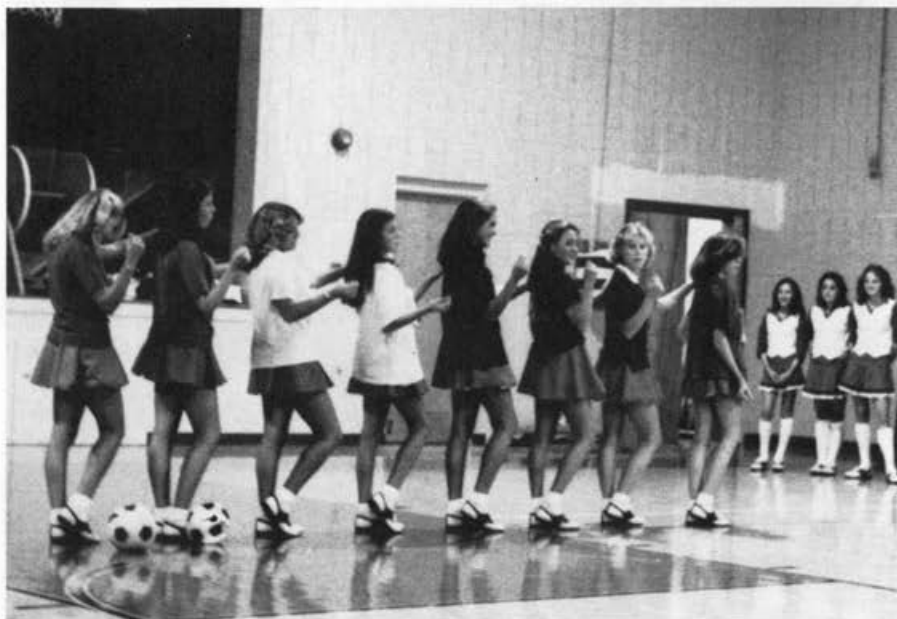
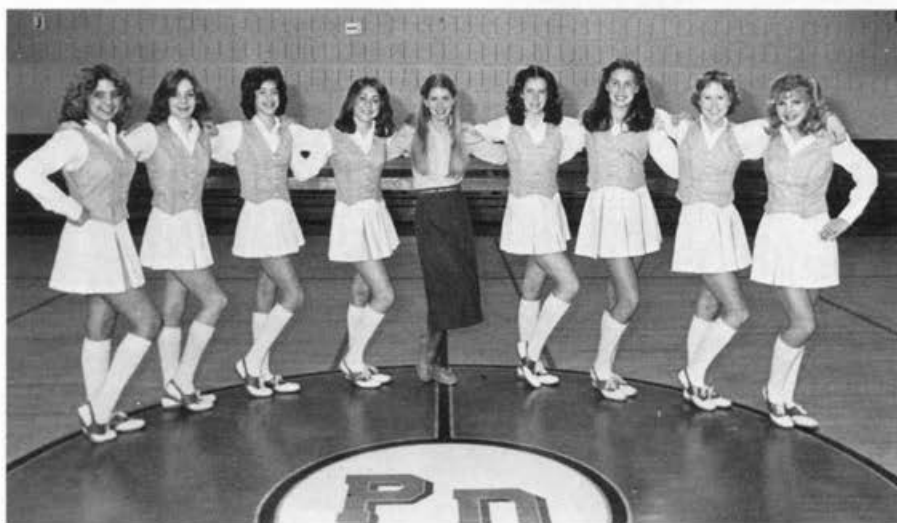
Varsity Cheerleaders

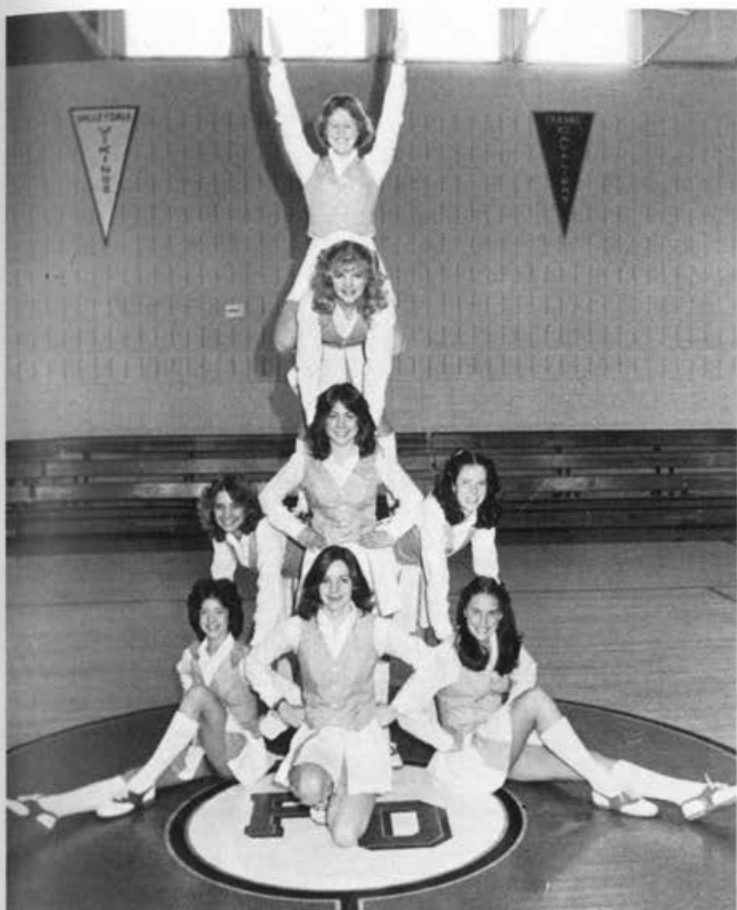

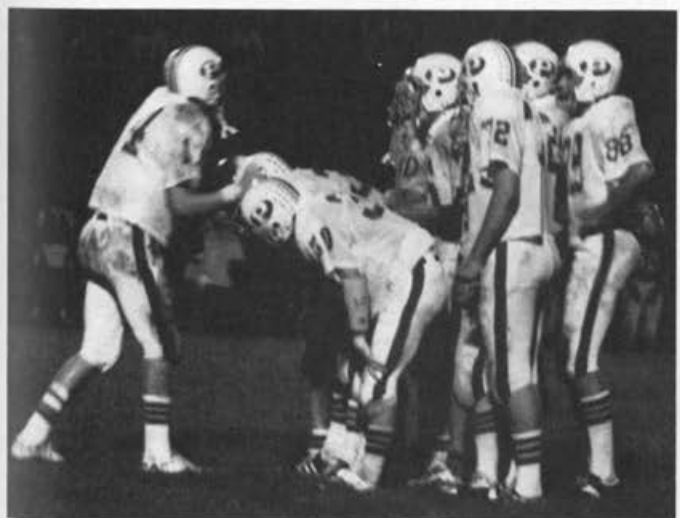

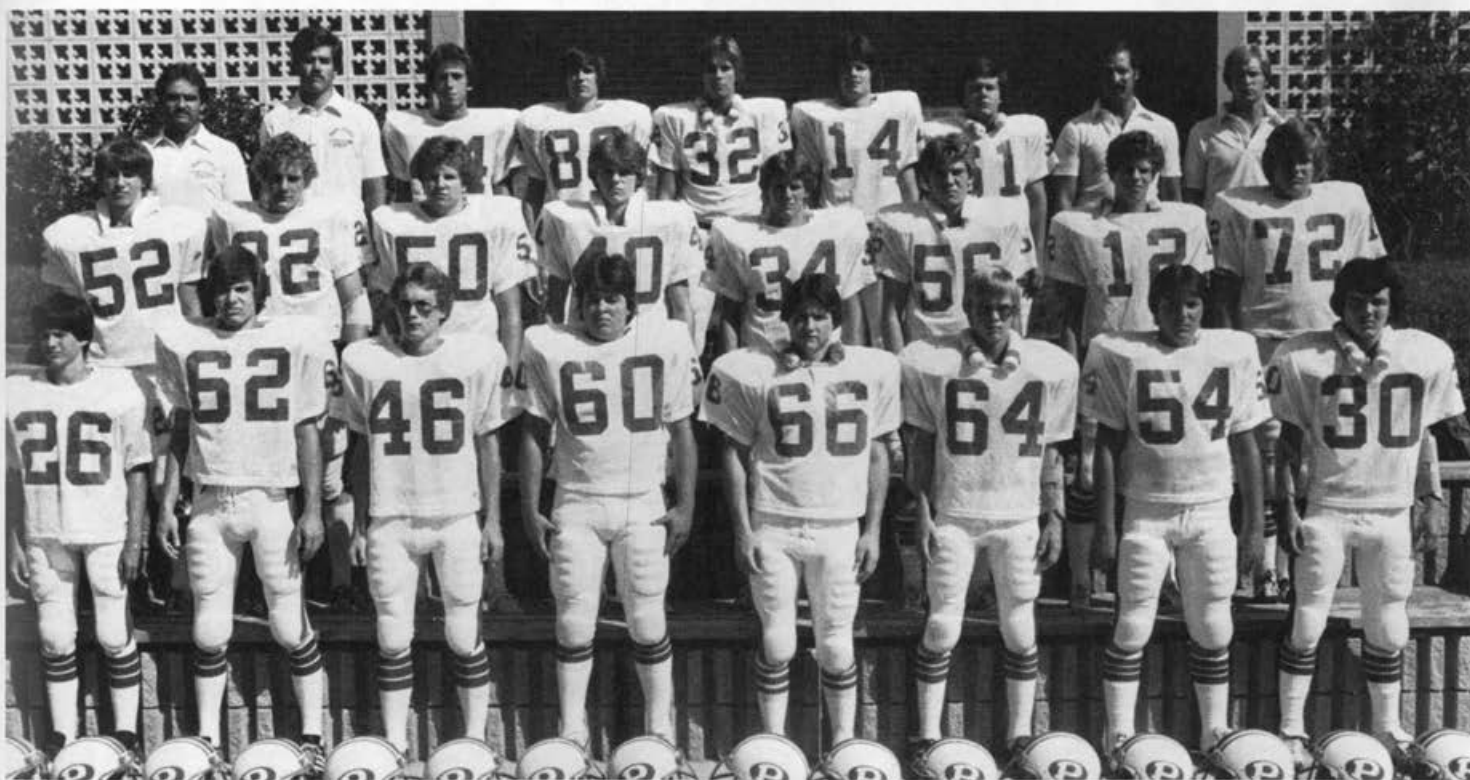

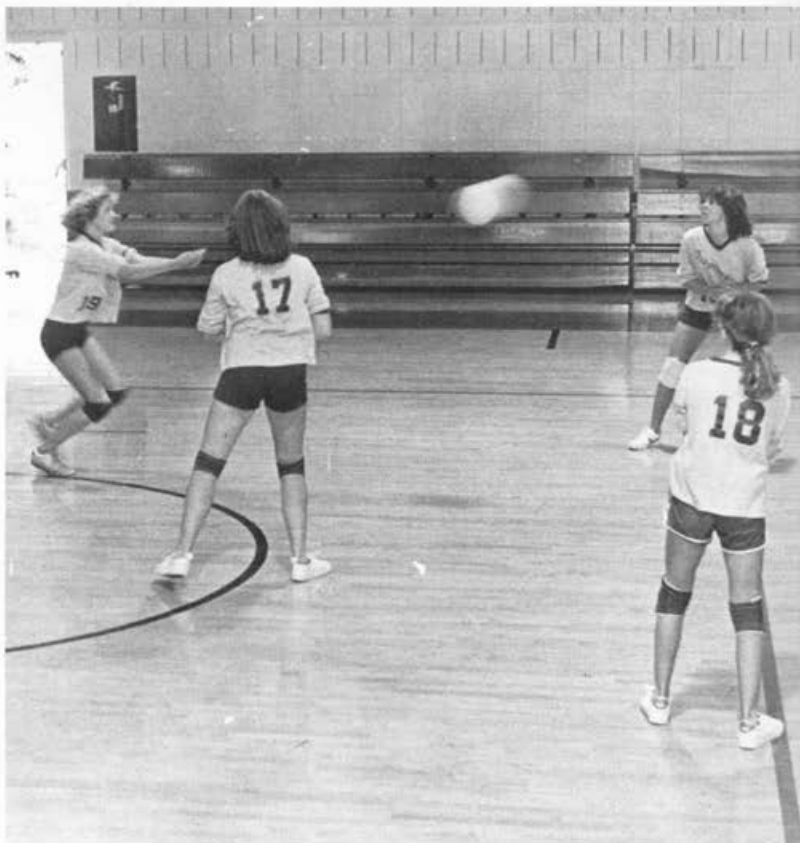

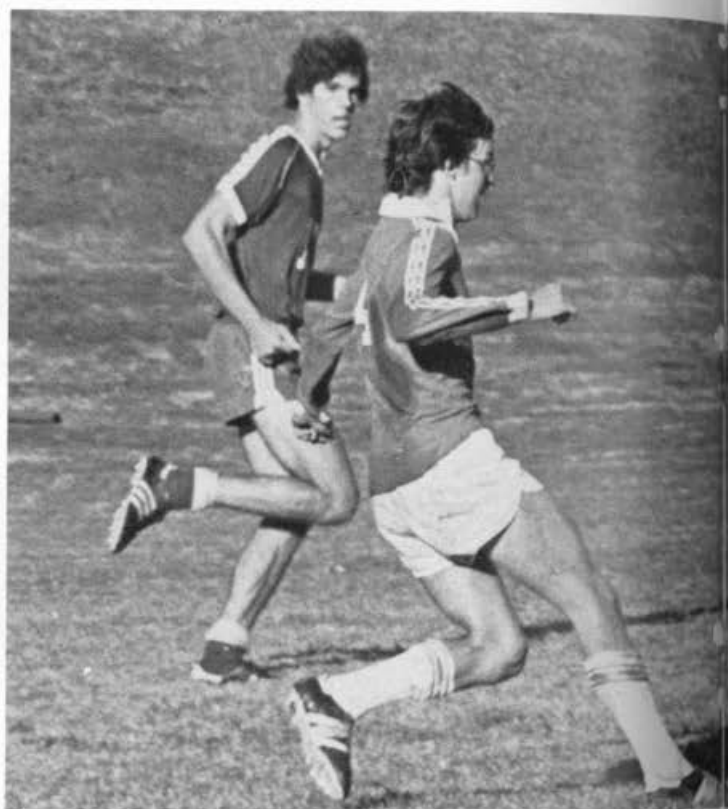
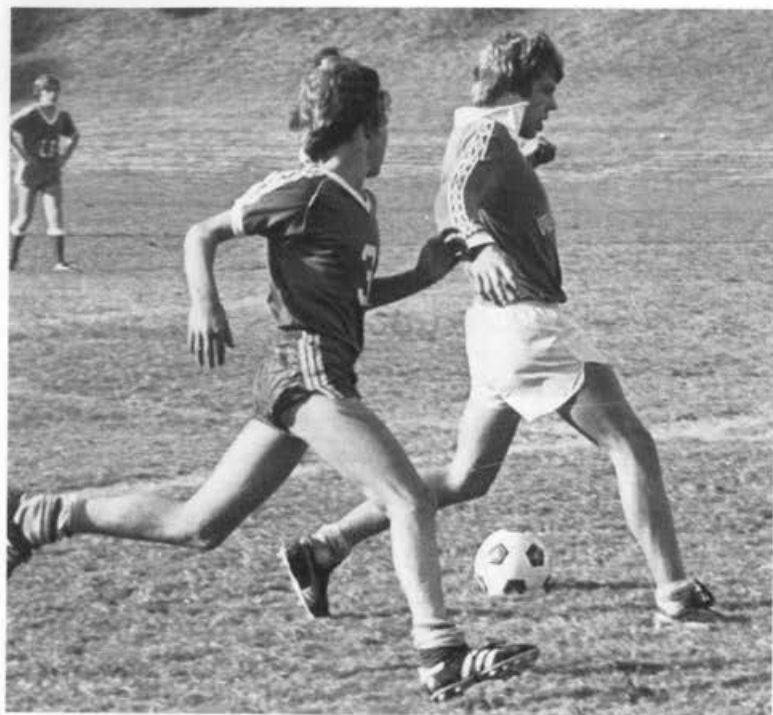




Cross Country

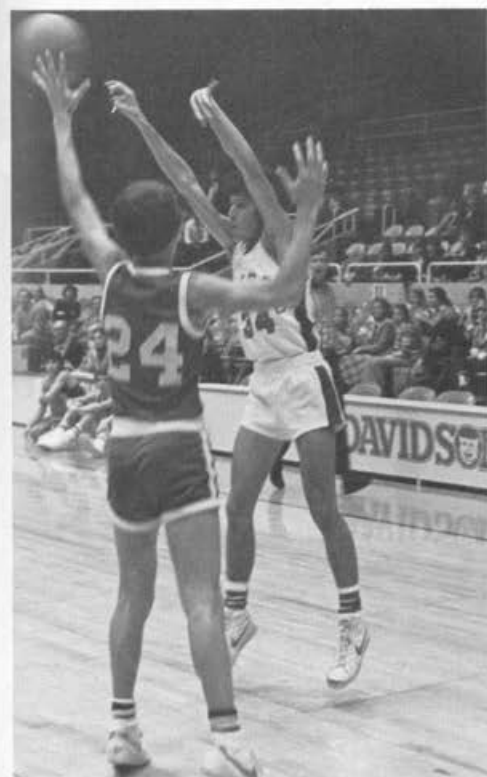

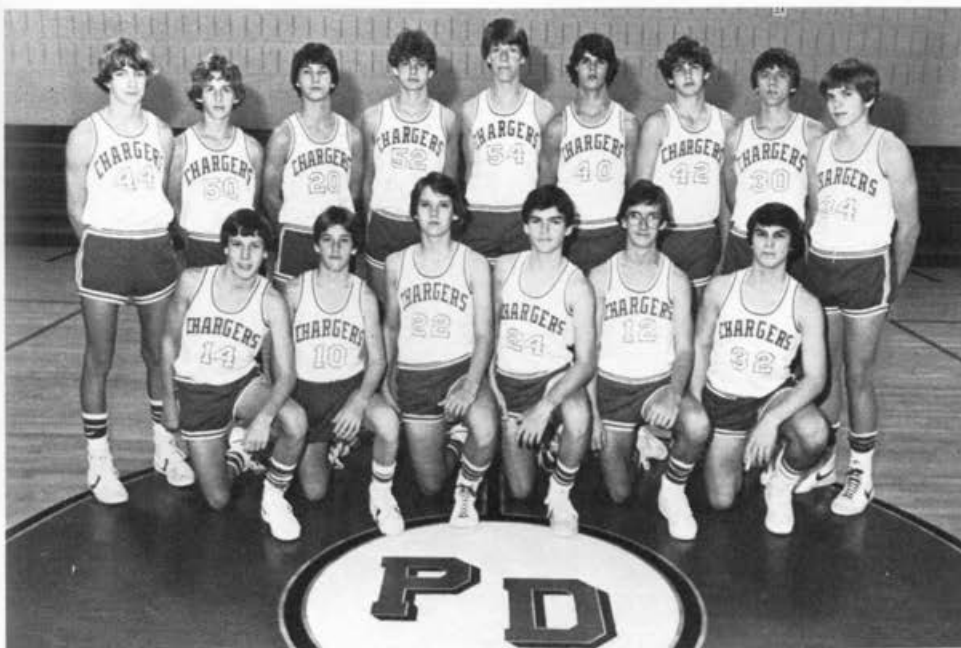

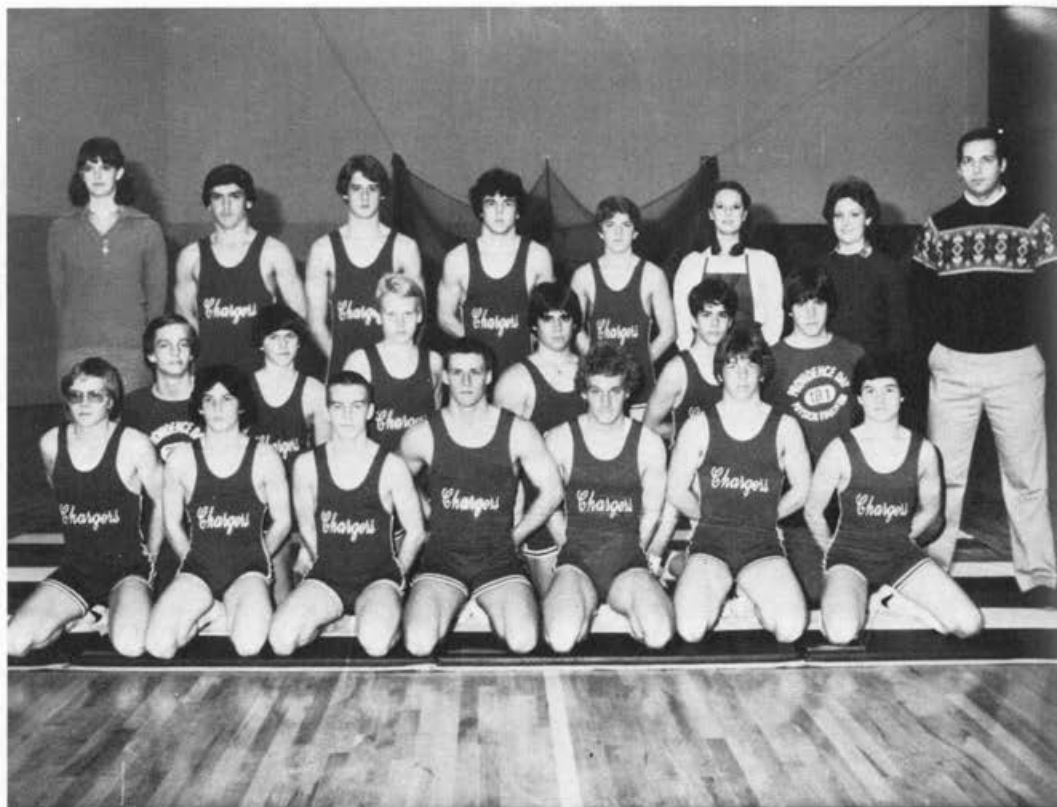

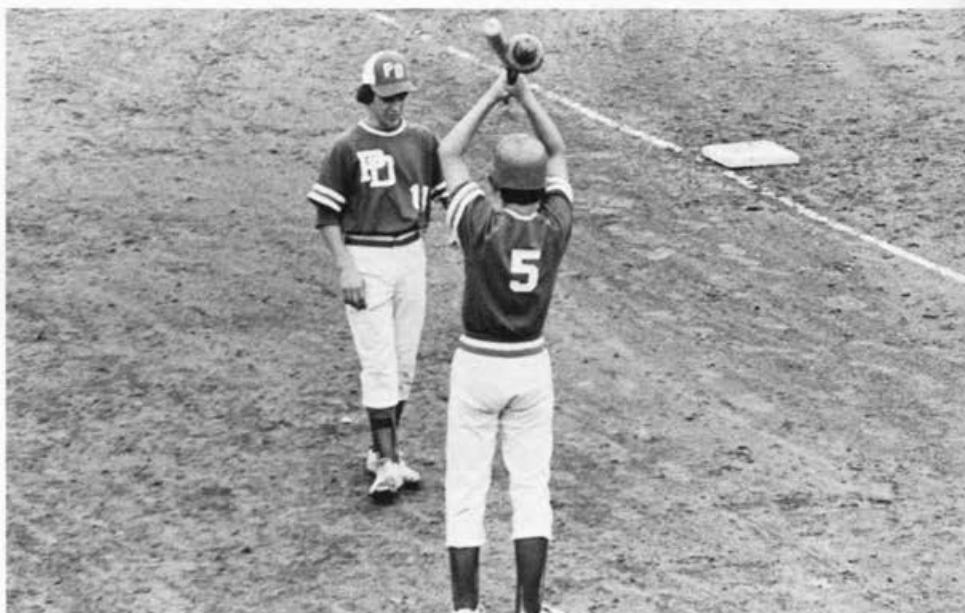
