

Robert Charles Eck (Rob) was born in Atlanta, Ga. on April 16, 1965 and moved to Charlotte, N. C. when he was 20 months old.

He was active in gymnastics, guitar playing, the YMCA winter swim team, was a member of Sardis Swim and Racquet Club swimming and diving team, Sardis baseball team, Trinity football team, and Boy Scout Troop 95 at Christ Lutheran Church.

On August 28, 1977, he lost his life in an accident. He would have been a member of the Class of '83.

While attending Providence Day School, he was on the A-B Honor roll and participated in the Inner School basketball

team, Ski Club, and was a member of the '77 J.V. football team. He enjoyed the teachers, sports, and fellowship at Providence Day.


The following is a short poem he wrote in his Sunday school class at Christ Lutheran Church on what Christmas meant to him.


Triumph

Varsity Football Reaches First State Playoff

The 1982 varsity football season was the best ever in the history of this young program. Winning a school record seven games, earning the right to play in the NCISAA semi-finals, and placing a record nine players on the all-district first team, the players accomplished many of the goals they had set out to achieve.

Battling to a school-record 7-3 final tally, the team out-scored their opponents 259-92 and worked long and hard to gather their many memories of success. While many will remember first-ever wins over Latin and Gaston Day, thrashing public school foe East Davidson, and pounding Asheville after having been humbled in '81, the talk of the season was the two contests against Country Day. In the state semi-finals, the Chargers met the Bucs for the right to win the state championship. Even though the 10-7 score went to the Bucs, everyone who stood in the rain agreed that all 24 players were victorious in their efforts.











J.V. Soccer Experiences A Competitive Season













The team was coached by Mr. Kin Mack, and the permanent captain was Susan Weir. Co-captains were named game by game.






Wrestling Program Continues Successful Growth





Under the guidance of Coach Ed Gash and Assistant Coach Tim Wooden, the PDS wrestling program continued its successful growth.




The girls' team, which had not won a meet all season, lulled their opponents into a false sense of security then won the state meet by two points over Latin.























Berry Allison, who received the Most Valuable Player award, won the most matches for the PDS hitters. His strong forehand and excellent serve were his strongest weapons.





Junior Varsity Tennis Gains Experience





The PDS Junior Varsity Team showed great improvement from starting the season with players who had very little experience to finishing the season with many good matches under their belt.













Scientists Pick

Publications such as **Charger**, **Liberty**, and **Pendragon** taught students about layout, copy and deadline pressures.



The P. E. Department is Physically Fit



Middle School Prepares For Future






This year they often went beyond their normal responsibilities by coming out on nights and weekends to set up for special events and to chauffeur for activities.






National Spanish Honor Society Recognizes Outstanding Students





The year began at summer camp at Furman University with many long and hot hours practicing. They received many blue ribbons, won the spirit pom, and a trophy to show their recognized talents.







Pendragon Supports The Arts At Providence Day

The school is fortunate to have such a talented group of students, a strong parent support group, and a dedicated advisor to bring music to our campus.








The production of the play **Heaven Can Wait** took many hours of practice after school and during class to help make it one of the most interesting, creative, and successful productions in Charger history.


Class of '84 "Capitolizes" on Explorations in D.C.

The third day was spent at Jekyll Island where the students did quadrat studies on sand dunes.


By spending four days together the students grew closer and gained a greater appreciation for the outdoors.




The Class of '82 Goes Out In Style






